enthusiasts usually buy their rockets in assembly-required kits that can be found at most hobby stores. Model rockets are made of a nonmetalic material, usually



Linnea Mitchem Receives Thurgood **Marshall Achievement Award**

This week the P.S.S. will highlight Linnea Mitchem. Linnea is being spotlighted for receiving the Thurgood Marshall Achievement Award. This award is given out to the overall top academic performer in the American Government class taught by Dr. Willie Fowler at Parkland College each semester. Linnea is the recipient for the Fall 2002 semester where she competed against roughly two hundred other students for the award. The award is from the Champaign-Urbana based Thurgood Marshall Society. According to Darlene-Amelia Tulua, President of the Society, the purpose of the Thurgood Marshall Society is to follow in the footsteps of Justice Marshall by advocating

Thurgood Marshall Sr. remains an integral part of American history and a role model for selfless service and achievement. Justice Marshall (1908 - 1993) was a champion of the civil rights movement who was most known for his role as the lawyer who argued the landmark 1954 supreme court case of "Brown vs. the Topeka Kansas Board of Education" which declared segregation unconstitutional. His impressive resume includes: Legal Director of the NAACP where he argued "Brown vs. the Board of Education, a circuit judicial appointment from President John F. Kennedy where all of his 112 rulings where upheld by the Supreme Court, an appointment to U.S. Solicitor General by President Lyndon B. A Farewell Review: The Dismemberment Plan



Annual Presentation Shares Usefullinformation About Anxiety Disorders

Approximately 160 students turned out for the annual National Anxiety Disorder Screening Day on Wed., April 30. "It's the biggest crowd we've ever had," said Linda Hodgett from the Counseling Center.

The program included a few words from Sten Johannsen, who runs a self-help group Tuesday nights at Provena Covenant, a short video, and ended with a discussion. The facilitator of the discussion was Doug Yore of the Champaign-Urbana Mental Health Public Education Committee (MHPEC). After the presentation, students were invited to get a free anxiety screening at the Counseling Center.

Knowledge of anxiety disorders is important for college students because we are so vulnerable to stress, especially in the weeks prior to final exams.

iNo longer is it depression or drug and alcohol abuse that are the biggest concerns for students, but anxiety, and many people don't know how to identify their symptoms as anxiety, ithe two.i

Counseling Centerís Marilyn Ryan said.

The presentation focused on anxiety disorders, symptoms of the disorders, and possible cures. There are five main categories of anxiety disorders- panic disorder, phobias, obsessive-compulsive disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, and generalized anxiety disorder. Anxiety disorders are the nationis most common mental health problem. It is estimated that 13 percent of adults ages 18 to 54 are affected by some kind of anxiety disorder in any given year. That adds up to approximately 19 million people in America that have some kind of anxiety disorder.

Each anxiety disorder has different symptoms, but symptoms may include recurrent, worrisome thoughts; depression; intense, irrational fears; headaches; nausea; and high blood pressure.

Yore stressed that most people can get anxious from time to time-before a test, for example. So if you find that you are suffering from headaches before a test, iyou may want to correlate the two.i affecting your the Counselin your doctor. Yo website of the Association www.adaa.org.

Anxiety should only be considered a problem iwhen it starts getting in the way of your everyday functioning. Most anxiety disorders are highly treatable and will go into remission with the proper treatment, i Yore said.

The lecture also stressed that medication is usually not the best way to treat anxiety disorders. Most medications, Yore said, are just iband-aid medsî, meaning that they simply buffer the symptoms of anxiety but do not cure them. The best treatment is therapy. The two kinds of therapy mentioned were behavioral therapy, which focuses on changing specific actions, and cognitive-behavior therapy, which teaches patients to understand and change their thinking patterns so that they can learn how to better handle the situations that cause them anxiety.



The Parkland College Athletic Program has completed their most successful conference season ever winning 6 of the 8 Collegiate Conference of Central Illinois titles. Coming off a record-setting five-title season in 2001-2002, the Parkland Volleyball team got things off to a great start in 2002, winning their seventh consecutive title. Later in the fall, the Men's Soccer team enjoyed a breakout season, capturing their first ever championship. The Women's Basketball team kept things rolling, earning their first #1 NJCAA National Ranking before wrapping up the CCCI title.

This spring, the Cobras were extremely impressive, winning all three championships up for grabs. Led by the #1 ranked Parkland Softball team (57-5), who won their first CCCI title after completing the conference season a perfect 32-0, the #4 ranked Baseball team (41-11) wrapped up their third straight title with a win on Sunday, and the #13 Golf team followed up with a title of their own winning for the second consecutive
