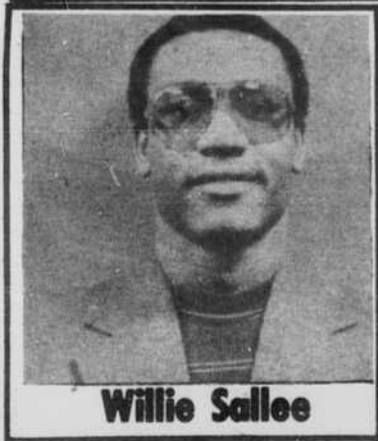

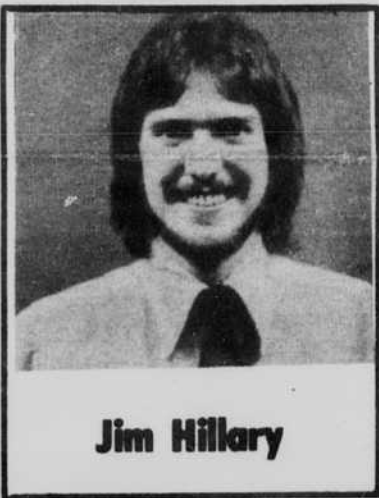

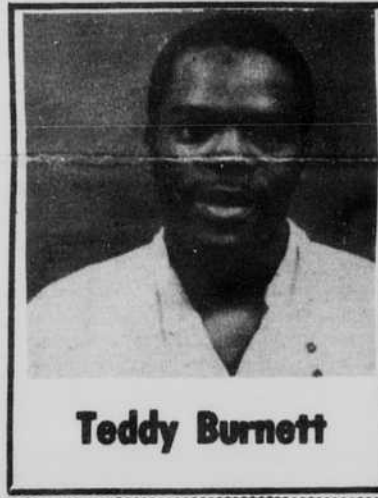
taxes to the Federal government they expect something in return. You should expect something too. If you don't know where your money is going, perhaps you better start caring.

# REO in class by themselves

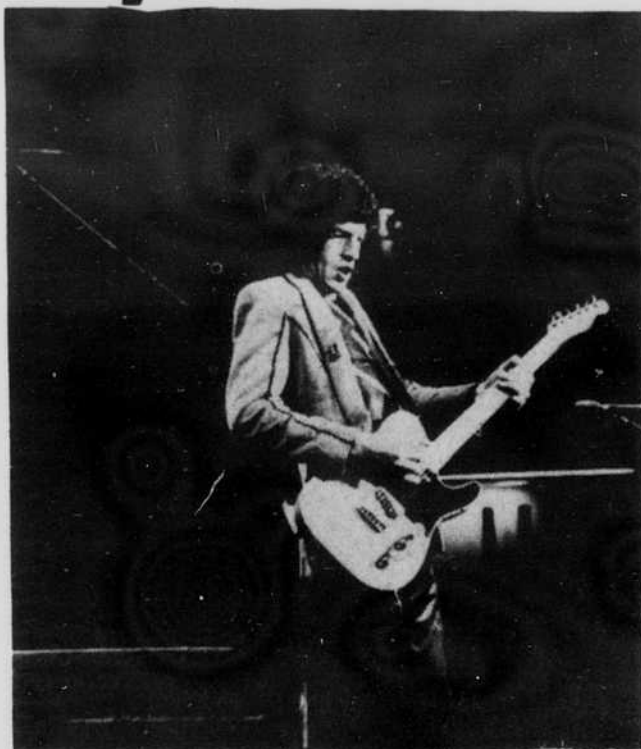

I must confess, I haven't been ramblin'. For the last month I have been stricken with the dreaded kissing disease "mononucleosis." Believe me it's no fun if you'd like to keep ramblin' take my advice. Watch what you kiss (thanks S.S., M.H. or C.M.?). I was well enough in time, though, to view the return of REO Speedwagon last Tuesday night.

Many believe that beauty is in the eye of the beholder and for the predominantly young crowd beauty is precisely what they saw. Playing to the largest Assembly Hall crowd (close to 17,000) since Elvis Presley REO put on the tightest rock 'n roll show of the year. Kevin Cronin's vocals, Gary Richrath's searing lead guitar, Neal Doughty's honky tonk piano, Alan Gratzner's drummin' and Bruce Hall's bass and harmony never sounded better. Even though many came to hear REO's older songs they were outnumbered by the newer legion of fans who came to hear the new stuff such as REO's first number one chart single "Keep On Lovin' You," "Tough Guys," "Take It On The Run" and "In The Letter," all from the number one album "Hi Infidelity." The rest of the show included all of REO's classics like "Like You Do," "Golden Country" and "157 Riverside Avenue." Most of the crowd went away pleased with the hour and a half show but this reviewer went away feeling like something was missing.

You see I remember REO when they practiced in an abandoned hardware store in my hometown of Tolono about eleven years ago. I have followed them on and off since then so they are a little more to me than a band that churns out hit singles. I had seen them in concert twice before last Tuesday night. Two and a half years ago on October 22, 1978, at the Assembly Hall and last spring at Lantz Gym in Charleston. What I saw Tuesday was no longer the band I had seen those two previous times. Something was different.

Gone was the band that told me to "Keep Pushin'" even when I thought my strength was gone. Gone were the guys that said "Being Kind" can hurt someone sometimes (so true). And gone were the guys that I, my buddies and a case of beer went "Ridin'".

The Storm Out" with every weekend for the past five years! Just this past weekend I was driving home from a party and found myself listening to "Summer Love" from "REO Live." I couldn't help but think back to all of my summer loves, as Gary Richrath's vocals made them come alive. After I got home I

stayed up until four a.m. listening to the rest of the album. Each song brought to life old memories and feelings that I thought I grew out of. After listening to the whole album I knew that "REO Live" had to be one of the greatest albums of all time. How could "Frampton Comes Alive" sell fifteen million copies worldwide (where's Frampton been the last three years?) and REO's just around a million? The point is that REO used to be a band that you play along with as they gave you advice and encouragement in songs such as "Keep Pushin'," "Our Time Is Gonna Come," "Ridin' The Storm Out" and "Roll With The Changes." Now they are a band that you listen to.

It's just like old classmates. REO and I used to be in the same class. They sang my life in their songs and we partied together every weekend. But REO has graduated. So to Kevin, Gary, Bruce, Neal and Alan, you're in a class by yourself now and all I can say come back and visit once in a while. It'll be just like old times.

"I'm gonna keep on lovin' you. Lots of work to do. I look forward to next week. It'll be our last chance to talk to one another so until then, nothin' but ramblin'."

# 1600 Relay, Cox, and Patrick take firsts in PC Invite

Parkland's track team made an impressive showing in their only home meet of the year last Saturday on a sunny, warm day.

Competing against teams like Illinois, Eastern Illinois, Illinois State, Florrisant Valley (a strong juco track team), Black Hawk, Danville, and many other talented unattached tracksters, the Cobras placed in 10 different events, including three first places and a pair of second place finishes.

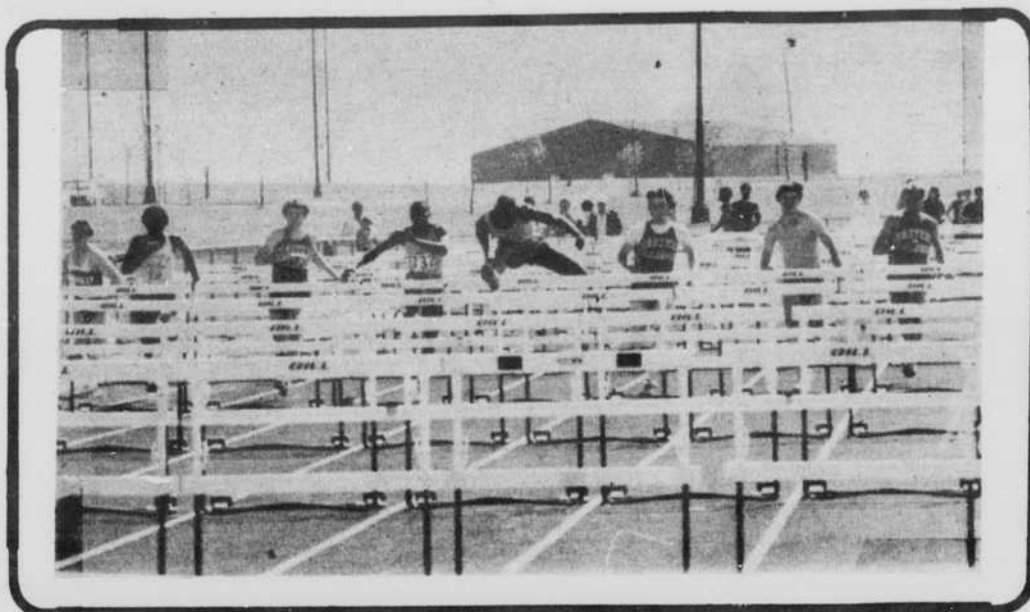
Junior Cox blew away the field in the 110 meter high hurdles with a time of 14.7. Mark Patrick took the 400 intermediate hurdles as he beat Chris Howell of Eastern Illinois by a little over a second. Patrick's time was 52.6.

The Cobras also won the 1600 meter relay by more than 12 seconds (3:16.3) over Eastern and

may have won the 400 relay if not for a poor exchange between Cox and Terry Walker on the third leg of the relay. Ray Hampton ran a super last leg and almost caught Florrisant Valley's runner but the poor exchange may have been the difference.

In the field events, Eric Foster placed second in the high jumps with a leap of 6-5. Cox and Casey Laughlin piled up numerous third place finishes. Paul Blissard threw the javelin 159-2 for fourth place but was far behind John Kemp of Eastern who tossed 187-7.

Illinois' high jumper, Gail Olson was also at the meet. But not as a high jumper! Olson ran the 200 meter race and finished sixth with an impressive time of 23.0 just behind Oscar Thomas of Parkland.



# Softball team eliminated in Sectional; Eye CIAC

Good pitching and explosive hitting was the key to Parkland's four game sweep last Monday and Tuesday over the University of Illinois and Kankakee.

A five run inning outburst, spearheaded by Janet Blacker's two run single and Nancy Shaw's RBI single, lifted the Cobras to a 7-5 victory holding off the U of I.

Suz Jones, 3-3 at the time, got off to a very shaky start, allowing two runs in the first and three in the third, but settled down from then on by giving up just two hits and walking nobody.

Blacker also had two runs score and added a hit later on while Shaw was a perfect 3-3 with a pair of RBIs.

In the nightcap, darkness may have saved Parkland as they finished a sweep of the Illini. The final score was 4-3.

Parkland held a 4-0 lead until the fifth inning when the Illini erupted for three runs. They threatened again in the sixth before the game was cancelled.

Freshman Kim Robinson survived the late game rally to record her second win of the year. An interesting point brought up by Coach Mike Marlow is that

Robinson's E.R.A. of 2.43, if it stands for the rest of the year, would have broken the previous E.R.A. record held by Karen Jannusch (3.40). Suz Jones crushed that mark last year with a 1.64 mark. Jones' earned run average this year is 1.67 against "much better competition than last year," according to Coach Marlow. He noted that the Cobras have played the U of I three games, Purdue, Anderson, and Illinois Wesleyan. All of these schools are four year programs. "Our record isn't as good as last year, but I feel this team is developing very well," Marlow said. The 1980 Cobra team holds the single season winning percentage of 18-7 (.720).

### Parkland vs. Kankakee

Fran Stalter crushed a three-run homer in the first inning of the opener and Suz Jones' solid pitching led the Cobras to a resounding 13-1 win.

Stalter's three run homer drove in Becky Murphy and Kas Short and got the Cobra offense off and running for a day of explosive scoring. They added three in the second and blew Kankakee away with seven tallies in the fifth on five hits. Three Kankakee away

miscues aided Cobra scoring but consecutive RBIs by Stalter, Janet Blacker, and Lori Anda turned the game into a blowout.

It was an easy win for Jones, pitching just five innings and giving up one run on three hits.

The Cobras romped 10-0 in the nightcap. Scoring three runs in the first and fifth, and four runs in the third while getting a combined no-hitter from Jones and Kim Robinson, the game was again over by the fifth inning.

Kas Short drove in three runs, all of them with a triple in the fifth, and Lori Anda added two RBIs in the win. Jones, 5-3, recorded her third straight win by striking out six in three innings.

Marlow feels that his Cobra team was ready for the Section Tournament which was played last weekend at Lincoln Trail. The Cobras opened against Danville.

Janet Blacker and Nancy Shaw drove in three runs apiece while Becky Murphy contributed three hits and two RBIs as Parkland's women's softball team beat Danville in the opening game of the Sectional Tournament by the score of 12-2 last Friday.

Kim Robinson picked up her third win of the year to give the Cobras a shot at Lincoln Trail, a

team ranked third in the nation.

PC played them close but a three-run first inning burst by Lincoln Trail was too steep of a hill to climb. They beat the Cobras 4-3. Suz Jones suffered the tough defeat despite pitching nearly perfect the last six innings. Jones was 5-4 at that time.

The Cobras then avoided elimination on Saturday with an 11-1 romp over hapless Danville, which was their second 10-run win over the Jaguars.

Becky Murphy drove in two runs while Nancy Shaw continued her torrid hitting with a three hit day. "Nancy is really coming along," said Coach Mike Marlow. Shaw's average, which was once below .200 is now a solid .289.

Kim Robinson remains a pleasant surprise for Marlow's troops as she pushed her overall record to 4-2 while her E.R.A. is a nifty 2.15. Marlow says, "Her (Robinson) and Suz are combining for an E.R.A. of 1.97 and that's interesting considering the team record for overall earned run average is just 3.19." That record was set last year mainly because of Jones' 1.64 mark. The team E.R.A. is a sparkling 2.73.

That good pitching wasn't good enough, however, to beat Lincoln

Trail later in the day. For the second day in a row, Lincoln Trail scored four runs off of Suz Jones and edged Parkland 4-2.

The game was a 0-0 deadlock until the bottom half of the fifth when Lincoln Trail took a 1-0 lead. The Cobras then broke the ice in the sixth on an RBI single by Becky Murphy, but after another hit and a walk, the Cobras stalled and left the bases loaded, which set the stage for the bottom of the sixth.

A double and a single plated one after Jones had gotten the first out. Then with two outs, the same combination of hits brought home two more runs.

Parkland scored a token run in the seventh on Judy Weber's single but the lead was too big for the Cobras.

Jones, 7-5, walked two and gave just six hits to possibly the best team in the state.

Although they are out of the state tournament, the Cobras will now try to win the CIAC. They were 11-8-1 overall and 4-0 in the conference before their doubleheader with Danville on Monday. Judging from the two scores in the Section Tournament, Danville had better work on a new strategy against the Cobras.

# Cobras rip Danville twice

Scott Kemper's three-run homer, his second of the year, was the decisive blow in the fourth inning of the first game to lead Parkland's baseball team to a 9-6 opening game win over Danville last Saturday. Their Friday conference game at Parkland was cancelled because of poor weather. Scoring all nine of their runs in

the last four innings and getting 13 hits enabled Marty Zamora to pick up the victory.

The nightcap was much easier as Steve Burden pitched a four-hitter and Parkland's hitters continued their onslaught with 10 runs and 16 hits. After tallying six runs in the third, Burden was able to coast in for the win. Bob Larson and Bill Elliott had five hits apiece overall in the doubleheader.

The Cobras now stand 20-14 overall and 6-4 in the CIAC and still have a doubleheader remaining with Danville and an important four-game series with arch-rival Lake Land.
