SABBATICAL REPORT Helen Kaufmann December, 1996

I very much appreciated both the break in the teaching routine and the chance to learn something new which the sabbatical provided.

Goals of the Sabbatical:

The goal of my Spring 1996 sabbatical leave was to bring international content into the courses in the Parkland College Literature Program.

I undertook the following projects:

- To design an international studies concentration for students in the Liberal Arts
 Program
- To review and read extensively in the literature of Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East
- To develop a course in non-western world literature which would meet the nonwestern humanities requirement for the LAS degree
- To prepare bibliographic materials and identify world literature selections to use as supplementary texts in existing literature courses

Activities Undertaken:

Designing an International-Studies Concentration:

The Associate in Arts degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences prepares Parkland students for transfer or career with a good general background plus a concentration of

courses in a particular discipline. Adding an option for International Studies to the twenty-eight concentration areas already listed shows Parkland's commitment to the international perspective and gives students the opportunity to identify with it. Courses with international content have been included from the following areas: geography, history, humanities, political science, and literature.

First, I met with the Social Science and the Humanities Department Chairs to determine which courses in these disciplines should be listed. I subsequently discussed the project with the Vice President and prepared the necessary catalog copy, which appears in the 1996-97 Parkland College Catalog.

Reading

My preparation for this major component of the Sabbatical began at the December 1994 Modern Languages Association Convention, where I spent many hours visiting publishers displays. I learned which companies publish the bulk of African, Latin American and other international texts and got copies of anthologies and individual works of "third world" fiction and poetry.

I obtained recommendations for reading as well from conversations with Parkland colleagues and instructors from the University of Illinois, as well as from Chinese friends with whom my husband and I traveled to China during the summer before my sabbatical semester.

I spent much of my sabbatical semester reading the literature I had collected.

Developing a Non-Western World Literature Course

The proposed non-western literature course falls under the following item in the

new general education descriptions for literature courses:

Item H3 908N: Non-Western Literature in Translation: Reading and analysis of representative masterpieces from a variety of nationalities and epochs.

I prepared the necessary documents to submit Lit 146 to the Curriculum

Committee and obtained approval of the projected new course in November, 1995.

After extensive reading in four recently published anthologies of world literature, I chose Shirley Geok-Lin Lim and Norman A. Spencer's *One World of Literature*. (Boston: Houghton-Mifflin, 1993) as the primary text for the course. Supplementary texts will include a novel, such as Chinewa Achebe's *Things Fall Apart* and some poetry selections. (See Attachment A, Course Outline)

Enhancing Existing Literature Courses and Recommending New Acquisitions for the Parkland College Library

The new course in non-western literature will be added to the list of literature offerings; in addition, literature instructors will be encouraged to add non-western selections to existing courses as well. I have met with the literature faculty and challenged them to read and incorporate into their classes some of the available non-western literature. I believe my colleagues are eager to do this. I have made available to them some resources developed during my sabbatical, including the following bibliographies: (see Attachment B, Bibliographies)

A Bibliography of Criticism and Anthologies of the literature of Africa, Asia,
 Oceania, the Middle East and Latin America, with library call numbers noted for all titles currently in the Parkland Collation;

- A Bibliography of the novels and collected short stories and plays of selected nonwestern authors. Those available in the Parkland College Library are starred and call numbers are noted.
- A list of specific non-western novels, poetry and short stories currently in print which
 are recommended for use as supplementary texts in the introductory courses in
 Modern Literature, Novels, Poetry, Short Fiction, and Women's Literature;

In addition, I have compiled a list of non-western literature currently in print to be recommended for purchase by the Parkland College Library.

Conclusions:

While pursuing this sabbatical project, I have kept in mind one of the stated goals of Parkland College, which reads: "To expand students' global awareness by providing opportunities for international studies and experiences" (Mission and Purpose Statement, *Parkland College Catalog, 1994, p. 17)*, and also the General Education Objective which reads: "The student will analyze the development and institutionalization of non-Western values found in Middle Eastern, African, Asian, and Latin American civilizations and compare their significance with western values and institutions." (*Parkland College Catalog 1994*, p. 67)

I believe that the activities of my sabbatical have laid the groundwork for our beginning to think globally in the literature program. As I have watched the evening news and seen families in Central Africa on the long trek back to their homes in Rwanda, I have been reminded of short stories from Africa about the return of refugees

to their homes. It is my hope that students will grow in understanding of fellow human beings as they read these stories and other literature of the non-western world.

We should increasingly take advantage of the unique opportunity we have as we teach

imaginative literature to help students not just to know about, but also to feel with people

of another time and place.

INCORPORATING NON-WESTERN LITERATURE INTO PARKLAND'S LITERATURE COURSES

Some of our existing literature courses already include a sampling of global literature; and some lit instructors already make it a point to add international content to their courses. For others who would like a bit of encouragement to include poetry or fiction from non-western perspectives, a list of resources is provided.
