## Methodology

It was through engaging in participant observation and conducting formal interviews that I gathered the bulk of my data. In addition to these, I held informal conversations with people exhibiting varying degrees of personal alignment with Catholic values; these conversations provided me with data that was qualitatively different from that gathered using the other two methods. While using participant observation to discover people's attitudes toward the issues I raised, I found that I had to adjust my initial head-on approach in favor of a more organic one in order to set things in motion.

Much of my data was gathered by conducting formal interviews and having informal conversations while talking to friends. The data collected by the two types of methods gave similar results. Still, the informal conversation provided much more context to the persons beliefs and how they stumbled into their beliefs. I believe that the methods of a formal interview allow a complex topic such as religion to be approached in a manner that makes others comfortable. It makes it much easier to broach the subject informally; this allows for more personal thoughts to be provided.

These were my findings:

- The older individuals I spoke
  with tended to have more
  positive evaluations of the
  Church's moral credibility
  despite generally sharing the
  same stances on religiously
  charged topics as the younger
  research participants.
- The younger individuals I spoke with, if they had been raised in the Church but were not currently practicing, tended to nonetheless report that their religious upbringing had played an important role in developing their conscience, even if they sometimes disagreed with the Church's moral teachings.
